TJ/FDR/MLK Study Visit:

Students will be introduced to shared American Political Values associated with each figure/memorial (liberty, equality, justice) and discuss how they see these values reflected in modern America and the issues that dominate national discourse

Students will learn the history of the memorial and its depiction of Ira Hayes to serve as the basis for discussion of how and to what extent the government honors the sacrifice of veterans and fallen soldiers
