n partnership with the Close Up Foundation, the Horatio Alger Association's American Enterprise Summit for Middle School Students is an opportunity for rising eighth-grade students. This is a fully funded program in which students and teachers travel to Washington, gather with their peers from across the country, and learn about the power and promise of the American Dream. Teachers can nominate 10 students from their school to participate in the program.

Throughout the program, students will:

- Gain awareness of the opportunities available through democracy and the free-enterprise system.
- Highlight the importance of the pursuit of the American Dream, focusing on freedom, equality of opportunity, and mutual respect.
- Participate in study visits in the nation's capital, including memorials, museums, and Capitol Hill.
- Learn about how our nation was formed and the importance of democracy.
- Engage with a diverse set of viewpoints and foster meaningful dialogue to promote understanding.

INCLUDED IN THE PROGRAM

- Airline tickets and tuition costs (covered by the Horatio Alger Association and booked by Close Up)
- Coach bus transportation to and from all activities in Washington, including airport transfers
- Daily meals and quality hotel accommodations (two students per room)
- Academic program materials, including a student guidebook
- 24/7 supervision, including instructional staff and night monitors
- Medical access to Georgetown University Pediatric Hospital

REQUIREMENTS

- Teachers will nominate 10 students from their school to participate in the program.
- Each school will send 10 students and one chaperone, who must travel to Washington together.
- Students must be rising eighth graders and complete the program application form.
- Students, parents, and teachers must attend a preprogram meeting.
